Today we celebrate Trinity Sunday. This Sunday touches the basic mystery behind all other mysteries of our faith. And the Father and the Son sent us the Holy Spirit to fill us with divine life, to make us truly God's children. 

The Feast of the Most Holy Trinity



The Feast of the Most Holy Trinity, which is always celebrated on the Sunday following Pentecost, is a great Solemnity because it honors the mystery of Who God Is: Three Divine Persons in One God. Trinity means "Three-in-One."

It is possible to use natural human reason to realize that there is a Supreme Being Who created the vast universe, but it would be impossible to figure out by means of natural reason that the Godhead is "Triune." The only way it could be possible for human beings to know this fact is if God revealed it to us. Jesus Christ, the Son of God, the Second Person of the Most Holy Trinity, revealed it when He came into the world to be our Savior. His last words to the Apostles before He ascended into Heaven clearly indicated that He had revealed to the Apostles that God is three Persons in One: "Go forth and teach all nations, baptizing them in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit" (Matthew 28: 19).

Saint Augustine was one of the greatest theologians in the history of the Church; he thought that he could figure out the mystery of the Most Holy Trinity, but he was shown (by an Angel) that, just as one cannot pour the entire ocean into a hole in the sand, a human mind cannot contain the immense mysteries of God. Another great theologian, Saint Thomas Aquinas, did plumb some of the depths of this mystery in his book, the *Summa Theologica*. Among other things, he has this to say about understanding the One Essence of the Three Persons in God: "Divine things are named by our intellect, not as they really are in themselves, for in that way it knows them not; but in a way that belongs to things created." This statement is a deeply philosophical way to say that we can't think like God because we are not Divine like God. Saint Hilary, whose theological writings predate both Augustine and Thomas Aquinas, explains it more simply by stating the Divine Nature "is proper to both Father and Son."

The Holy Spirit, the Third Person of the Most Holy Trinity, is the Love of the Father for the Son and the Love of the Son for the Father. Their mutual Love is so completely perfect and fruitful that a Third Person then exists who is of that same Divine Nature.

A rudimentary way of comprehending these elusive concepts is to think of God the Father as All-Perfect, All-Beautiful, All-Holy Being who looks in a perfectly pure mirror and sees His Image. That Image is distinct from Him; that Image (or "Word") is His Son– Eternally being begotten by Him. Son looks at Father and Father looks at Son, and their Love is so Perfect that their mutual Gaze is the Holy Spirit.

What we can take from these high philosophical distinctions about the Most Holy Trinity is really very simple and can be summed up by the words of Saint John the Evangelist: "God is Love" (1 John 4: 8). God is not a static entity but active Being who is infinitely Good, infinitely Fruitful, infinitely Giving of Self. This is the powerful and awesome mystery that is celebrated each year on Trinity Sunday.

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

The first thing that came to mind when hearing the readings for this feast was the song, How Can I Keep from Singing? Moses' words attest to the wonders of God and his continual care and "championing" for us. This all-powerful God chose us to be his own; he created us in love and desires for us to be with him forever. He loves us enough to have become one of us - to live and breathe and suffer as one of us! While on earth as Jesus Christ, he showed us, in healing and forgiving, the depth of his merciful and unconditional love. Through the Son we are made adopted children of God, co-heirs with Christ to the promises of the Kingdom. The Holy Spirit is sent to remain with us - always - demonstrating the steadfastness and faithfulness of God to his people and drawing others to the Father's love. And we, members of the Body of Christ, are commissioned to go "and make disciples of all nations," that all may be given the pathway to the Kingdom. With all this Good News, how can we keep from singing?

GO EVANGELIZE PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

"When they all saw him, they worshiped, but they doubted." These words jumped out at me from today's Gospel. After all the Apostles had witnessed, even after their encounters with Jesus following his resurrection, they doubted. That is, until Jesus reassured them that "All power in heaven and on earth has been given to me." Then, look out! Once empowered by the Spirit, the disciples no longer doubt. In readings from the Acts of the Apostles throughout the Easter season, we have heard how the Apostles are transformed into bold and relentless preachers and leaders, healers and miracle workers, by their belief in the power of the Holy Spirit. And they can't suppress the joy they know in believing the Good News. We were made for this joy, and for sharing it as the earliest disciples did. Given all that God has done for us, how can we not?

STUDY Read Scripture verses or hymns that rejoice in God's love and bring you joy (Phil 4:4-9 is a good start). Pray the Act of Faith to reaffirm your belief in the Trinity. Be a joyful Christian!
