Message from Father Bobbin

Dear Parishioners,

For the past few months we have been taking a tour of the prophetic books of the Old Testament. We have one left: the Book of Daniel.

Daniel is considered one of the four major prophets with Isaiah, Jeremiah, and Ezekiel, although Daniel is considerably shorter. The story is set in the time when the Babylonians established rule over Judah in the years before the destruction of Jerusalem. Daniel and his companions are taken to Babylon as hostages, where they are challenged to be faithful to God in a pagan country.

The book has apocalyptic qualities, such as the role of dreams and the prediction of future events when good will triumph over evil. In chapter 2, Daniel interprets Nebuchadnezzar's dream about a statue that represents a succession of pagan empires (Babylon, Persia, Greece, and Rome). In the end, a stone taken from a mountain without a hand being put to it (suggesting divine action) destroys the stature.

The book also contains the familiar stories of Daniel and his companions surviving the fiery furnace after refusing to participate in pagan worship (chapter 3), Daniel surviving the lion's den (chapter 6), and a vision of the coming of the Son of Man (7:13-14), which Jesus Himself will refer to (see Mark 14:62).

The theme that runs through the Book of Daniel is the clash between true worship and false worship and the challenge of being faithful to God when living in a pagan environment.

Burial Plots

Because tragedy can strike at anytime ... when clear thinking and action can be sacrificed to the moment's need ... we want to remind our parishioners and friends that St. John the Baptist Cemetery offers its services whenever that need occurs.

Grave Lots \$ 600.00 each which includes Perpetual Care Regulations / Guidelines

The following are guidelines established by St. John's Cemetery Committee ...

- * Shrubs are **not** permitted on cemetery grounds
- * Flowers or plants may be planted in the ground, but must remain within 12 inches of base of memorial. **NO Perennials** are permitted.
 - All artificial decorations must be removed within 14 days after specified holidays which are: Easter, Mother's Day, Memorial Day, Father's Day, July 4, Christmas, etc.
- * <u>Placing of artificial flowers in the ground is forbidden doing this creates many</u> problems during cutting season.
- * All rubbish is to be taken with you or placed in available receptacles located at top of cemetery
- * Please refrain from placing any tombstone in or on the grounds for one year after a death to allow the ground to settle back to its natural state.

Neh 8:2-4a, 5-6, 8-10 | 1 Cor 12:12-30 | Lk 1:1-4; 4:14-21

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE Late 19th-century English author G.K. Chesterton famously wrote, "Catholic doctrine and discipline may be walls, but they are the walls of a playground." We can think of God's commandments serving as rules governing primary school recess: by providing us with a structure in which we can explore, play, stumble, and get up again, they allow us to discover who God created us to be without wandering far from his love. The mosaic law that served the Jews in today's first reading had given them the necessary parameters to live and grow within the covenantal relationship they had with God. Their unfaithfulness had led them astray, but upon their return from exile in Babylon they wept when hearing God's word for the first time in generations. They knew the power of God's commandments to keep them safe and secure in his love, and recognized all they had lost by wandering. Their sorrow was turned to joy in the knowledge that God rejoiced in their return to him.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Just as Ezra "opened the scroll so that all the people might see it" in today's first reading, Jesus also "unrolled the scroll" and then rolled it back up so that all might see him. Ezra held the law in his hands, Jesus is the fulfillment of the law in himself. Jesus' words in today's Gospel, "Today this Scripture passage is fulfilled in your hearing," were an infusion of new life breathed into a new creation by God who is outside of time. All things, all mistakes, all failures brought about in our human pride and disobedience were being refashioned into new brick and mortar to build God's kingdom in and through Christ. Jesus, with his commandment to love one another as he loves us, gives us structure and a true freedom to discover who God created us to be, while helping us not wander far from this playground the Lord has given us. Knowing what holds us together, and relying on it to guide us, enables us to help build the kingdom even more for the glory of God and the good of others.

LEARN

Research a Catholic teaching you do not fully understand for example, why Catholics attend Mass on Sundays. Ask God for the light to see how this teaching is life-giving instead of lifelimiting. If you have the opportunity, share what you've learned with someone.
