Message from Father Bobbin

Dear Parishioners,

Today we begin Holy Week. This is the high point of the year for Christians when we commemorate the central mysteries of our faith: the death and resurrection of our Lord for our salvation. I encourage you to participate as fully as possible in the liturgies of Holy Week. Simply attending these liturgies is an easy way of appreciating our faith more deeply and having a more meaningful experience of Easter.

The Paschal Triduum forms the bridge between Lent and Easter: the three days from the evening of Holy Thursday to the evening of Easter Sunday. On Holy Thursday we celebrate the Mass of the Lord's Supper (7pm) to celebrate the institution of the Eucharist and the priesthood. At the end of Mass, the Eucharist is taken in procession to the chapel. This is one of the very rare occasions when the Eucharist is absent from the main church. The removal of the Eucharist from the main church and the night of private prayer before the Eucharist in the chapel recalls Jesus' prayer in the garden and arrest after the Last Supper.

On Good Friday we remember the death of Jesus. This is the only day of the year when Mass is not celebrated. At 3pm, the traditional hour of our Lord's death, we celebrate a unique liturgy consisting of readings from Scripture, including the Passion According to John, special intercessory prayers for the world, veneration of the cross, and (although it is not Mass) the opportunity to receive Holy Communion, consecrated at Thursday evening's Mass.

Holy Saturday is a day of waiting until we celebrate the Easter Vigil (at 8pm), the greatest liturgy of the year. Using the symbolism of light and darkness, we bless and light a new Paschal Candle, the symbol of the risen Jesus. We listen to a series of Scripture readings that recount God's saving work in history, culminating in the Resurrection. The Easter Vigil is the time when adults are baptized into the Catholic faith or enter full communion with the Church. Our parish does not have any candidates this year, but we will bless the baptismal water and renew our own baptismal promises at the Easter Vigil before the risen Jesus becomes present among us in the Eucharist once again.

Palm Sunday of the Lord's Passion

Is 50:4-7 | Phil 2:6-11 | Lk 22:14–23:56 or Lk 23:1-49

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Palm Sunday can seem like a study in contrasts. We hear the jubilant account of Jesus riding triumphantly into Jerusalem. Then we listen to the Passion narrative, reminded that Jesus' kingship bears little resemblance to royalty as we perceive it. He will suffer and he will die. As Paul describes it, "He humbled himself, becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross. Because of this, God greatly exalted him." Jesus tries to explain this to the disciples, who don't fully grasp the events about to take place, instead quarreling over who would be the greatest. Yet even in this chaos of misunderstanding, Jesus continues to teach them, promising that those who stand by him in his trials will join him in the kingdom of heaven. There are certainly times when we fail to fully perceive and understand all that the Lord is teaching us, or why we are undergoing certain trials and difficulties. As we enter into Holy Week, we can ask Jesus to help us understand the meaning of the cross in our own lives, using this time to reflect on the meaning of his sacrifice for each of us.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

As we listen to the Passion narrative, we hear Peter betray Jesus, the soldiers jeer at him, and a passer-by being told to carry Christ's cross. Only Luke's account describes the two criminals, one of whom demanded that Jesus "save yourself and us." The second criminal rebukes him, asking Jesus to "remember me when you come into your kingdom." After Jesus dies, the centurion glorifies God, a good man takes him down from the cross, the women prepare his body for burial. As we enter Holy Week, we will have time to reflect on Jesus' last days, but also on the individuals in the crowd the day he died. How did they react? How would we have reacted? What can we learn from the women who staved beside Jesus, the criminal who looked beyond his own pain and sin to see Jesus as Messiah, and even Peter in his initial betrayal? During the week ahead, we can also make an effort to attend each liturgy of the Triduum, using this time to deepen our faith as we prepare for Easter.

PRAYER Take time to read the Passion narrative at home. Invite Jesus into your heart. If you've fallen a little behind on your Lenten commitments, Holy Week is a great time to hit refresh.
