

Message from Father Bobbin

Dear Parishioners,

The Second Sunday of Easter has taken on a special significance as "Divine Mercy Sunday." Every year on this day we hear the Gospel of the risen Jesus appearing to the Apostles, first without Thomas on the evening of the resurrection and then, a week later (today), with Thomas present. It is unfortunate that this Apostle has become known as "doubting Thomas" because, in the end, he makes a beautiful act of faith in Jesus and the occasion is one of reconciliation.

Easter is all about reconciliation. Our faith is all about reconciliation. Jesus died and rose so we can be reconciled with God. This happens first by our Baptism into the death and resurrection of Jesus. But after Baptism, God in His mercy gives us another sacrament that reconciles us to Him when we fall into sin. On the very evening of Easter Sunday, when Jesus appears to the Apostles, He gives them the ability to forgive sins in His name: the sacrament of Confession.

Throughout Lent, my weekly message was about various aspects of Confession. And we tend to focus on going to Confession in Lent as a way to prepare for Easter. But perhaps one of the best ways to celebrate the Easter season is to meet the risen Jesus in Confession once again (and to make a habit of it), allowing the grace of Easter, God's unlimited mercy, to continually pour out upon us.

DO YOU HAVE A LOVED ONE IN THE HOSPITAL?

The HIPPA privacy protection act prohibits the release of patient information admitted to hospitals or nursing homes. Each facility interprets HIPPA differently which often precludes the sharing of this information with your pastor.

In the event of a loved one being hospitalized or admitted to a long term care facility, an authorized family member should inform the parish office.

If Father's schedule permits he will visit your loved one. Remember the number of our priests in the area have dwindled. If it is an EMERGENCY, we will have a priest attend to your loved ones needs in a timely fashion. Please do not wait until the last possible moment to contact a priest. Please also note that patients admitted through the Emergency Room are not asked to specify a religion/priest/or parish.

Acts 2:42-47 | 1 Pt 1:3-9 | Jn 20:19-31

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

"I'll believe it when I see it." We've all said this at some point, usually in response to hearing about someone unreliable doing something out of character. St. Thomas had the same reaction in today's Gospel when he wasn't there when the other disciples saw Christ for the first time since he rose from his tomb - "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands and put my finger into the nailmarks and put my hand into his side, I will not believe." Although Jesus helped Thomas with his unbelief, he blesses those who have not seen, but believe. Have any of us seen the nail marks in Christ's hands and feet, or the wound in his side? Do we see Christ's body and blood on the altar, or do we see only the gifts of bread and wine? Christ comes to us in ways we can understand initially - parables, bread and wine, the face of people we meet throughout our daily lives - but our faith in what we have not seen, in the great mystery of our salvation, is what makes us Christian.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

In today's first reading, we hear reports of the lives of the first disciples soon after Pentecost: communal living, breaking bread together, prayer, selling of their property and possessions and redistributing among themselves according to individual needs. To our ears today, this idyllic community living seems almost incredible. Yet these first disciples were infused with the Holy Spirit, who enabled them to proclaim the Gospel and think of others before themselves. As Christ's disciples today, how are we behaving toward one another? If we truly are among those who have not seen and yet believe, let's act in full confidence. As we heard in the second reading, our faith is "more precious than gold that is perishable even though tested by fire." We certainly aren't perfect, and our faith at times can be sorely tested, and yet this is our call: to share this faith by doing good works in Christ's name to make disciples and build the kingdom of God.

INVITATION People often see Christ through the words and actions of others. This week, actively seek out opportunities to be the hands of Christ. What opportunities does your community have to practice corporal works of mercy?
