Message from Father Bobbin

Dear Parishioners,

Perhaps by now you have learned some things about Pope Leo XIV. One way to get an insight into the Holy Father is to reflect on the name he chooses. Just as Pope Benedict XVI was looking back to Benedict XV in choosing a name, we now need to look back to Pope Leo XIII.

Leo XIII was the last pope of the 19th century. He died in 1903. He was the first "modern" pope in the sense that he was the first pope to be a purely spiritual leader, not a worldly leader. His predecessor, Pius IX lost the Papal States (the territory in Italy ruled by the pope) during the Italian Revolution. Leo XIII would be the first pope to be free from the responsibilities of secular rulers, which gave him a greater moral authority. The whole world could look to the pope as a purely spiritual leader, as we said. In addition, Leo XIII had a more open attitude to the modern world than some of his predecessors. He believed in building bridges with the modern world, not taking a defensive attitude toward modern society.

One of the things Leo XIII is best known for is the beginning of Catholic Social Teaching. Responding to the problems of the Industrial Revolution, he wrote the encyclical *Rerum Novarum* ("On New Things") to address various topics that have to do with the relationship of the individual to the larger society, for example, the rights of workers. This began a body of social teaching that has continued to the present day. Catholic Social Teaching covers critical themes such as the dignity of human life, marriage and the family, rights and responsibilities, care for the poor, the dignity of work and the rights of workers, solidarity, and care for the environment.

No doubt our new Holy Father has these things in mind as he begins his ministry. We continue to join the universal Church in supporting him with our prayers!

Acts 15:1-2, 22-29 | Rev 21:10-14, 22-23 | Jn 14:23-29

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE A quip on a church marquee has stuck with me for years: If you feel distant from God, guess who moved? In last Sunday's Gospel, Jesus told his disciples that he would be with them "only a little while longer." Of course, we know the full story: Jesus did not abandon his followers. Today we hear of his parting gift to them and to us. Although Jesus would soon return to the Father, he was sending someone to minister to the disciples and to encourage them in their mission: "The Advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you everything and remind you of all that I told you." Often in our lives, when we feel distant from God, we may wonder if the Lord has departed from us. In these seasons, remember that Jesus - who has never broken a promise - did, indeed, send the Holy Spirit to be with us. Take heart in moments of trial and call upon the Spirit, the Advocate, whose name in Latin means "he who is called to one's side." He will come close, reminding you of the goodness of God and encouraging you on the path to heaven.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Today's second reading narrates St. John the Apostle's vision of the heavenly Jerusalem. John describes the radiant splendor of this place "like that of a precious stone." Though the vision is resplendent, John observes: "The city had no need of sun or moon to shine on it, for the glory of God gave it light, and its lamp was the Lamb." God himself is the source of light which illumines heaven. But he is likewise present among us and his reign is meant to extend on earth as well. With the help of the Holy Spirit, we can, therefore, prepare for heaven while also striving to bring God's glory to earth by living for him each day. So many times we have prayed the words of the Lord's Prayer: "thy kingdom come, thy will be done, *on earth as it is in heaven.*" Allow the glory of God to illumine your everyday life. Call upon God's grace and the Holy Spirit to witness to his truth, beauty, and goodness.

REFLECT

Inviting the Holy Spirit to act as our Advocate, how do we reveal the glory of God in our daily activities? As you begin your work, study, or household tasks, offer him your undertakings (and your heart) and ask him to transform the mundane into the sacred.
