

Message from Father Bobbin

Dear Parishioners,

Last week we started looking at the four Gospels. Before we learn about each one individually, there is one more question to explore by way of introduction. As we look at the four Gospels, we should soon notice that Matthew, Mark, and Luke are quite similar to each other. But the Gospel of John is very different in style and some content.

Matthew, Mark, and Luke are called the Synoptic Gospels. This means they see things the same way. A lot of the content is the same. In fact, they are the same word-for-word in some places. This means there is some sort of literary dependence among these three Gospels. One or more of the Gospel writers must have used one or more completed Gospels as a source of information. What is the relationship among Matthew, Mark, and Luke? Scholars call this puzzle the Synoptic Problem.

The most popular theory, though not the only one, is that the Gospel of Mark was written first. Mark is the shortest Gospel and almost all of Mark's content is contained within the Gospels of Matthew and Luke. Matthew and Luke are believed to have each used Mark as a source. However, we also need to account for a lot of material that Matthew and Luke have in common with each other that is not found in Mark. It is theorized that Matthew and Luke had another written source in common that no longer survives. Finally, Matthew has some unique content that is not found in any other Gospel. Luke also has unique content found in no other Gospel. This material must have come from oral accounts or written sources that no longer survive.

Whatever the explanation for the similarities among Matthew, Mark, and Luke, all three Gospels, along with John, have come to us under the guidance of the Holy Spirit. The finished products contain God's inspired Word. We will look at each individually starting next week



The Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ

Gen 14:18-20 | 1 Cor 11:23-26 | Lk 9:11b-17

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Today's feast is set apart to reverence the gift of Jesus in the Eucharist. In our limited human capacity, this concept can feel abstract, and we may struggle to understand it. In these moments, I find that pondering the person of Jesus Christ in the Gospels illuminates my mind and heart. Hearing the familiar story of the multiplication of the loaves and fishes in today's Gospel, I'm particularly struck by the first line of the passage: "Jesus spoke to the crowds about the kingdom of God, and he healed those who needed to be cured." Notice that Luke doesn't say that Jesus heals everyone, rather, he heals those who need to be cured. This is not an act of favoritism, but a revelation of his perfect divine wisdom and a glimpse into the true person of Jesus Christ. In his great mercy and perfect love, Jesus knew instantly what each person needed. And this Jesus, who came to heal and cure, is the one we receive in the Eucharist today.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Today's feast is a reminder of the staggering truth that 2,000 years later, at every Eucharistic celebration in Catholic churches around the world, Christ becomes truly present. The same Jesus of the Gospels who taught the crowds, multiplied the loaves, and gave himself completely on the cross, gives himself to us *today:* body, blood, soul, and divinity. We are not unlike the crowds in today's Gospel — we have come with our hopes and needs to encounter Jesus. Today, at this table, no one goes hungry; Jesus meets our needs by giving us his unconditional love while nourishing us both physically and spiritually. We can be reassured that God is always present in our lives.

REFLECT

In a special way today, reflect on the Eucharist, the "source and summit of the Christian life." The word Eucharist comes from Greek and Latin words for "thanksgiving." Pray with a grateful heart today that Jesus, the Bread of Life, makes himself truly present to us.

"I am the bread of life; whoever comes to me shall not hunger, and whoever believes in me shall never thirst." (Jn 6:35)


