

Message from Father Bobbin

Dear Parishioners,

One of the last things on our minds in the middle of summer is... Christmas. However, Parish Council and I have been discussing our Christmas Eve Mass schedule and we think it best to communicate any changes far in advance since a change in Mass schedule may affect some of your family traditions.

Last Christmas Eve, we celebrated Mass at 4pm, 6pm, and 10pm. The 4pm Mass was comfortably full. It was not over-crowded. The 6pm and 10pm Masses each had no more people than a typical Sunday Mass (about 100 people each). These two later Masses can easily be combined into one.

Streamlining the Mass schedule is desirable because it would be less exhausting for the priest, deacon, and organist. It would also be easier to get enough liturgical ministers for Christmas Eve (readers, altar servers, extraordinary minister of the Eucharist, ushers). Some of our liturgical ministers are away or simply unable to serve at certain times on Christmas.

We would like to consider Christmas Eve Masses at 4pm and 7pm. The early Mass would not be affected much. The 7pm would be our solemn "night" Mass and perhaps incorporate our children as we have done at the 6pm Mass.

In the near future we will do a survey to get your input as we did for the photo directory. If there is a strong desire to keep the current Mass schedule, we will not make any changes (this year). We are all, understandably, attached to "my" Mass time, but we would ask that you consider the good of the entire parish.

Because tragedy can strike at anytime ... when clear thinking and action can be sacrificed to the moment's need ... we want to remind our parishioners and friends that St. John the Baptist Cemetery offers its services whenever that need occurs.

Grave Lots \$ 600.00 each which includes Perpetual Care

Regulations / Guidelines

The following are guidelines established by St. John's Cemetery Committee ...

- * Shrubs are not permitted on cemetery grounds
- * Flowers or plants may be planted in the ground, but must remain within 12 inches of base of memorial. **NO Perennials** are permitted
- * All artificial decorations must be removed within 14 days after specified holidays which are: Easter, Mother's Day, Memorial Day, Father's Day, July 4, Christmas, etc.
- Placing of artificial flowers in the ground is forbidden doing this creates many problems during cutting season.
- All rubbish is to be taken with you or placed in available receptacles located at top of cemetery
- * Please refrain from placing any tombstone in or on the grounds for one year after a death to allow the ground to settle back to its natural state.



St. Bonaventure Bishop and Doctor of the Church


St. Bonaventure, known as "the seraphic doctor," was born at Bagnoregio, in the Lazio region of central Italy, in 1221. He received the name of Bonaventure in consequence of an exclamation of St. Francis of Assisi, when, in response to the pleading of the child's mother, the saint prayed for John's recovery from a dangerous illness, and, foreseeing the future greatness of the little John, cried out "O Buona ventura"-O good fortune!

At the age of twenty-two St. Bonaventure entered the Franciscan Order. Having made his vows, he was sent to Paris to complete his studies under the celebrated doctor Alexander of Hales, an Englishman and a Franciscan. After the latter's death he continued his course under his successor, John of Rochelle. In Paris he became the intimate friend of the great St. Thomas Aquinas. He received the degree of Doctor, together with St. Thomas Aquinas, ceding to

his friend against the latter's inclination, the honor of having it first conferred upon him. Like St. Thomas Aquinas, he enjoyed the friendship of the holy King, St. Louis.

At the age of thirty-five he was chosen General of his Order and restored a perfect calm where peace had been disturbed by internal dissensions. He did much for his Order and composed The Life of St. Francis. He also assisted at the translation of the relics of St. Anthony of Padua. He was nominated Archbishop of York by Pope Clement IV, but he begged not to be forced to accept that dignity. Gregory X obliged him to take upon himself a greater one, that of Cardinal and Bishop of Albano, one of the six suffragan Sees of Rome. Before his death he abdicated his office of General of the Franciscan Order. He died while he was assisting at the Second Council of Lyons, on July 15, 1274.

Answers to What's Your Catholic I.Q.

- 1. True. The repetition of the same prayer 50 times in the Rosary frees our minds to focus on the mysteries of Jesus' life, death and resurrection.
- 2. (a) Catholics especially religious orders of monks and nuns pray the Liturgy of the Hours throughout each day. The goal of the prayers of the Liturgy of the Hours is sanctifying every moment of every day through praising God.
- 3. (d) "The Church and the world have a great need for Eucharistic worship. Jesus awaits us in the sacrament of love. Let us not refuse the time to go to meet him in adoration, making amends for the serious offenses and crimes of the world"
- 4. (d) King David wrote Psalm 23, which describes how God takes care of us no matter what.
- 5. False. Catholics use all forms of prayer including: singing, silence, meditation, Bible reading, Mass, praise, petitions, memorized transitional prayers, spontaneous person prayers, etc.
- 6. (a) "Christian prayer extends to the forgiveness of enemies Forgiveness is a high point of Christian prayer Forgiveness also bears witness that, in our world, love is stronger than sin."
- 7. (b) Distractions show us what occupies our hearts and minds. These distractions make clear what we need to let go of so that God can be number one in our hearts. We cannot serve two masters.
- 8. (a) by uniting our sacrifices and sufferings to Jesus' passion and death on the cross, we join him in his loving surrender to the Father for the salvation of the world.
- 9. (c) To pray we need to fight distractions, the devil's temptations, as well as our own laziness and sinful nature. The batter of prayer is part of the "spiritual battle" to act and live like Christ.
- 10. True. Our postures can express our prayer —- i.e., kneeling, bowing, reaching up to the heavens, blessing ourselves with holy water when entering the church, and so on.
