

Message from Father Bobbin

Dear Parishioners,

I thought it would be helpful to sum up some of the things going on in the areas of events, maintenance, and improvements.

- 1. We would like to have a parish get-together on Saturday, September 24, since we were unable to have a summer festival. But this will depend on people stepping forward to help coordinate the day. Please give us a call as soon as possible if you have an interest in helping. Hopefully we can return to a summer festival next year. Again, it depends on you.
- 2. Work is finally starting on the stone wall between the church and rectory. Thank you for your generous contributions to our repair and maintenance fund. They are greatly helping to lessen the financial impact of this critical project.
- 3. Some work has also started on the Russell Building, the porch and fire escape in particular. We are continuing to work with Gillingham, which has an interest in making use of the building, particularly the second floor. We are insisting on a plan that will not in any way compromise our parish's use of the building for our own activities.
- 4. There are always new maintenance issues to address. If you come to Mass early, you may have noticed that the church lights have not been coming on normally. We are waiting for the control panels to be repaired. Until then, the priest has to go up to the choir loft and turn everything on and off manually.
- 5. Our mural of St. John the Baptist by Kim Searle is now complete. We will bless it after one of the weekend Masses sometime soon.
- 6. Because of some incidents with votive candles, we will be reducing the number of real candles and investing in a couple racks of electric votive lights. Personally, I prefer real candles. But I also prefer not burning down the church.

Twentieth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Jer 38:4-6, 8-10 | Heb 12:1-4 | Lk 12:49-53

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

My mom loved her Nintendo 64. We especially enjoyed "Paperboy," a video game where a paperboy riding a bicycle attempts to deliver newspapers along Easy Street, Middle Road, or Hard Way. He has to avoid obstacles that pop up along the way barking dogs, mailboxes, skateboarders, trash cans, you name it! Sometimes life can seem that way. We can't predict which obstacles will pop up, but the author of the Letter to the Hebrews encourages us to persevere, "keeping our eyes fixed on Jesus." Whether we're riding along "Easy Street" or "Hard Way," we can look to Jesus to help us overcome the hardships that may come our way because we are his followers. As Jesus tells the disciples, following him will not always be easy and may even result in conflicts within our families. When that happens, we can look to the example of Jesus and the great "cloud of witnesses" to whom the Letter to the Hebrews refers, knowing that peace and reconciliation await us at the finish line.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

I used to have great fun watching my boys at our neighborhood swim meets. Even as my then-7-year-old zig-zagged into the lane lines during the backstroke, I would yell "Go! Go! Go! You've got this." (And, please, someone catch his head at the finish!) He couldn't hear a word I said. I wonder if it's a bit like this when it comes to the "cloud of witnesses" – the saints, known and unknown, who encourage us in our faith. We can't see them or hear them, but we know they are there. In turn, we can become cheerleaders for others running the race alongside us: offering encouragement, prayers, and reminding one another of the joy that awaits us. Spoken or silent, our prayers can help us and others persevere in our faith and place our trust in Jesus when times are tough.

STUDY The *catechism* chapter 3, The Characteristics of Faith (153-165), references this passage from Hebrews on being surrounded by a cloud of witnesses. Read especially #165.

FEAST OF THE ASSUMPTION OF MARY FEAST DAY — AUGUST 15

When it was time for Mary to die, her body was taken up—assumed—into Heaven to be with the Blessed Trinity forever. Mary was the mother of Jesus Christ, who is God the Son, the Second Person of the Blessed Trinity. Her body is very special, so God preserved it from death. Mary reigns in Heaven as Queen, and her Son Jesus is King of the Universe.



The Blessed Mother Mary lived many years after Jesus was resurrected and ascended into Heaven. Saint John the Evangelist took her into his home and cared for her. She, in turn, supported the Apostles and the first Christians. At the time of Mary's death, Tradition tells us that the Apostles placed her body in a tomb set aside for her, but when they went back later to pray over her, her body was gone! In the picture above, the Apostles stand around her coffin marveling, because it is filled only with lilies.

Different theologians over time have argued that Mary may not have died at all. In the Eastern Church, they call her death the "Dormition," meaning that she just went into a kind of "sleep" rather than expiring. Whether she actually died is not critically important; what matters is what happened next! The Church teaches that Mary's body was "assumed" [taken up] into Heaven, where she was welcomed by the Heavenly Court of Saints and Angels and honored by the Most Holy Trinity. The picture above attempts to show both the earthly reality—the absence of her body in her tomb—and the Saints and Angels in Heaven greeting her with joy as she meets her Son Jesus—who after His Ascension, was also taken up body and soul into Heaven.

It just makes sense that Mary, whose body carried the Incarnate Son of God for nine months before His birth, should be preserved from death and honored as holy in this way. And her Assumption anticipates, as does Christ's Ascension, the glorified bodies that all the faithful will enjoy in Heaven. For these reasons, the Assumption is a feast of great joy for all Christians; for Catholics, it is a Holy Day of Obligation.
