

Message from Father Bobbin

Dear Parishioners,

October is traditionally the month of the rosary. Although we think of the rosary as a prayer to Mary, it actually invites us to reflect on the mysteries of the life of Jesus as we ask Mary to intercede for us. If you don't already have a habit of praying the rosary, consider starting this month. Because the rosary is a repetitive, meditative prayer, it can be prayed while we are doing other activities (for example, driving) that leave our minds free for prayer and reflection.

As we pray each of the five decades of a rosary, we are invited to reflect on five mysteries of the life of Jesus. The Joyful Mysteries are about the events surrounding the birth of Jesus. It is traditional to pray the Joyful Mysteries on Mondays and Saturdays. The Joyful Mysteries are:

1. The Annunciation: Think about the angel Gabriel announcing to Mary that she will be the Mother of Jesus. Mary accepts this mission – without fully understanding it, but with trust in God – and participates in God's plan to save us. What is God asking of me today?

2. The Visitation: Think about Mary, now pregnant with Jesus, traveling to the home of Elizabeth and staying for three months to help. Mary is literally bring-ing the presence of Jesus to Elizabeth. Who will I bring Jesus to today?

3. The Birth of Jesus: Think about the Savior choosing to be born into our world in a very ordinary manner, virtually unknown to humanity. How is Jesus present in the ordinary circumstances of my day?

4. The Presentation of Jesus in the Temple: Think about Mary and Joseph presenting the infant Jesus to God in the Temple according to Jewish custom. How do I practice my faith today?

5. The Finding of Jesus in the Temple: Think about 12-year-old Jesus staying behind in the Temple because He knew He had a mission to fulfill from the Father. As an adopted son or daughter of the Father, do I live with a sense of mission? How do I fulfill it today?

We will look at the other mysteries of the rosary in the coming weeks.

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

I used to be something of a sugar fiend. So much so that one birthday, my then boyfriend (now husband) decided to forego flowers and bought me a jumbo-sized bag of Smarties candies instead. While I loved sugar, I eventually decided I didn't love how it made me feel. Now older and wiser, I reach for vegetables more often. It's not that I crave carrots, but I feel better eating healthy foods. It's what God intends for my body. Similarly, God intends for our souls to follow the laws he has ordained. But sometimes life gets tough and we suffer terrible wrongs or are grieving, and we feel like the Israelites in today's first reading, calling out, "The Lord's way is not fair!" Well, thank God for that! How lost would we be, if God treated us "fairly." Instead, he treats us with love and mercy; with justice. "He humbled himself, becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross," for us. If there is any encouragement in Christ, as Paul says, and we know there is, then being of the same mind and heart - attitude - of Christ, gets us through those moments of "unfair!" And we can follow Christ's commands, knowing he loves us more than anyone else could love us, and more than we can ever love him.

GO EVANGELIZE PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

It's easy to talk a good game as Christians. We can all agree that it is right to feed the hungry, shelter the homeless, clothe the naked, visit the sick and imprisoned and bury the dead, as the Corporal Works of Mercy instruct us. But when it comes to actually doing those things – "humbly regard[ing] others as more important than [ourselves], each looking out not for his own interests, but also for those of others" – we can find all sorts of reasons not to. Maybe our days are too busy or maybe we feel just the tiniest bit resentful at the idea of sharing something we've worked hard to earn. However, our words don't mean much without action. Jesus says as much in today's Gospel. If we are like the son who says yes but then does not go to work in the vineyard, we are not doing our Father's will. We are like the chief priests who are being bypassed on the way to heaven by "tax collectors and prostitutes" who heard the word of God and believed.

PRAY This week, let us look for ways to live out our faith. Rather than pray only with our words, let us pray with our actions. If you aren't sure where to start, pay special consideration to the verses from the second reading, highlighted above: "Do nothing out of selfishness or out of vainglory; rather, humbly regard others as more important than yourselves, each looking out not for his own interests, but also for those of others."

SAINT OF THE DAY

Saint Thérèse of the Child Jesus (1873-1897) Feast Day: October 1

"The cornerstone's dated 1872, but the stained glass is much later," explained the pastor, astonished when his visitor accurately dated it to just before the Great Depression, explaining, "The window for the Little Flower"—Thérèse's nickname—"gives it away." From her canonization in 1925, her statues and windows adorn most churches where European immigrants worshiped. Entering Carmel at fifteen, victim of tuberculosis at twenty-four, Therese proposed her "Little Way" to sanctity: doing ordinary tasks with extraordinary love. Thus "ordinary Catholics," many of whom had lost loved ones to tuberculosis, embraced her. Though she never left her cloister, this Carmelite's spiritual communion and devoted correspondence with missionaries earned her the title Patroness of Missions. Her autobiography, *Story of a Soul*, continuously in print since her death, chronicles her prayerful perseverance through doubt and caused her to be the youngest person ever named a Doctor of the Church. Countless physical healings and spiritual conversions testify to her fulfillment of her deathbed promise: "After my death, I will let fall a shower of roses. I will spend my heaven doing good upon earth!"
