

Message from Father Bobbin

Dear Parishioners,

This Sunday is World Mission Sunday. It is much more than just another monetary collection to support the missionary work of the Church throughout the world.

Today reminds us that evangelization – spreading our faith – is part of who we are. At the very end of Matthew's Gospel, Jesus sends out the Apostles with the words: "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you..." A follower of Jesus should always be "on the move," so to speak.

However, Catholics today tend to be rather quiet and reserved. Perhaps we are afraid to stick out from the people around us. We know that our faith is challenging to individuals and to society and we are afraid to offend. Or maybe we feel as though we don't know our faith well enough and we are afraid of being asked questions we can't answer. So we tend to practice our faith quietly and keep it to ourselves when we are with family, friends, coworkers, etc.

Today reminds us that the Church's missionary work is not just a matter of bringing our faith to distant parts of the world where Christians are few in number. It is just as important (if not more so) to share our faith right here at home. In recent decades the Church has spoken of a New Evangelization: the work of bringing the Gospel back to societies that were formerly strongly Christian but are much less so today, societies like our own.

So today is an opportunity to help the Church's missionary work around the world by our monetary donations. But, far more importantly, today reminds us to ask our Lord for the wisdom and courage to share our faith by word and example with the people in our own lives.





GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

How often do we pray with abandon? Perhaps when turbulence makes us wonder if our plane's going down, when a friend or loved one faces a difficult diagnosis or life-threatening injury, when we face a setback, a major decision, or a heartbreak. On some days, though, have we been guilty of just going through the motions when we pray? Not so for Bartimaeus. "Jesus, son of David, have pity on me," he repeatedly implores, ignoring the shushing of the crowd. When Jesus asks him what he wants, the blind man doesn't beat around the bush. "I want to see." Recognizing his faith, Jesus heals him. Bartimaeus could not see, yet he had recognized Jesus as the Messiah and persisted in prayer. His example reminds us to be persistent in prayer, holding nothing back from Jesus who desires to make us whole.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

While Bartimaeus faced physical blindness, this did not prevent him from recognizing Jesus as the Son of David, the Messiah. In our modern-day world so filled with distractions, we can become blind to the face of Jesus, or simply take his abundant love for us for granted. As the psalmist reminds us, "The Lord has done great things for us. We are filled with joy." Looking back on our lives, we can probably see a few miracles – the birth of a child, the stunning beauty of a sunrise over the mountains or the arborvitae in our backyards, the friends who walk alongside us through each chapter of life. Today's readings encourage us to open our eyes to the face of Jesus in our lives, and in turn to reflect his steadfast love to those we encounter.

PRAY Read today's psalm response: "The Lord has done great things for us; we are filled with joy." Reflect on experiences and people who have brought you closer to God – friends, family, or your parish priest. Write them a note or say a prayer of thanksgiving.

Regulations / Guidelines

The following are guidelines established by St. John's Cemetery Committee ...

- * Shrubs are not permitted on cemetery grounds
- * Flowers or plants may be planted in the ground, but must remain within 12 inches of base of memorial. **NO** Perennials are permitted.
- * All artificial decorations must be removed within 14 days after specified holidays which are: Easter, Mother's Day, Memorial Day, Father's Day, July 4, Christmas, etc.
- * Placing of artificial flowers in the ground is forbidden
- * All rubbish is to be taken with you or placed in available receptacles located at top of cemetery
- Please refrain from placing any tombstone in or on the grounds for one year after a death to allow the ground to settle back to its
 natural state.
