Dear Parishioners,

The Old Testament lists more than 600 laws by which the Israelite people were to live. In this Sunday's first reading the Lord tells the Israelites the laws regarding treatment of aliens, widows, and orphans, and the lending of money to the poor. Jesus in the gospel is asked by a scholar of the law what is the greatest commandment in the law. Jesus answers with two commandments concerning the love of God and the love of neighbor.

Jesus, in fulfilling the law, tells us that the whole law and the prophets depend on these two commandments – loving God and loving our neighbor as ourselves. Living by God's law is the best advertisement in drawing others who want to know and follow Jesus Christ. Our actions really do speak louder than our words.

WEEK 3: THE POWER OF THE SACRAMENTS

Grace is God's Gift

- Grace is "free undeserved help that God gives us to respond to his call to become children of God" (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 1996).
- Sacraments are visible signs of an invisible grace.

Sacrament of Reconciliation

- "The whole power of the sacrament consists in restoring us to God's grace and joining us with him in intimate friendship." (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 1468)
- There are 4 steps in this sacrament: conversion, confession, penance, and absolution.
 - o Repentance is turning away from the way you were going and turning towards God.
 - o Sin is personal, so we need to come to Jesus and repair our relationship with Him.
 - o Penance is not to earn God's forgiveness, but it is done out of authentic sorrow for our sins.
 - When we receive absolution, our souls are healed.

Sacrament of the Eucharist

- "The source and summit of the Christian life." (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 1324)
- What does the Eucharist do for us?
 - We are nourished by the Lord's Supper.
 - We experience intimacy with Christ.
 - We are in communion with one another.
 - We offer thanksgiving to God.
 - We are given grace for the journey.

Parish Profile

Rick and Beth Smith



Rick and Beth Smith have been parishioners at St. John's for 35 years. They have been teaching 5th grade CCD together for over 25 years. They raised their 4 children in the parish and now have 6 grandchildren. In addition to teaching CCD, they have been involved with Children's Liturgy, marriage preparation, Dramatic Stations, Vacation Bible School, and they are trained as pastoral lay ministers.

What influence does your Catholic faith have on your life?

Rick: I spent a lot of time in prayer because there's been so much going on and my mom especially taught me how important God is with life in general. She instilled in me a deep prayer life. I try to bring everything into prayer. I get up early in the morning and raise up my family and my concerns and before I go to bed I make sure I end my day with prayer. My faith has helped me get through a lot of difficulties.

Beth: I wasn't always Catholic. I was Protestant. My grandparents went to church every Sunday. My parents never went. I used to walk across town on a Sunday morning and meet up with my grandparents to go to church with them. It wasn't until I married Rick that I went through RCIA and became Catholic. I was drawn to religion from the time when I was smaller. After my grandparents stopped going to church because of their health, I would go by myself. I used to get myself up on Sunday morning and go to church and then go to my grandparents after church. We used to spend Sundays at my grandparents' house.

Rick: I like that we both approach our faith differently. Beth's prayer life is more private. She will go for a walk alone. Mine is more public. People will see me pray. I think it gives us a full experience of the faith because we both get something from each other.

Grow & Go October 25, 2020

Thirtieth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Ex 22:20-26; 1 Thes 1:5C-10; Mt 22:34-40

GROW: In today's Gospel, Jesus has just silenced one group of religious leaders, the Sadducees (which seems to be quite a feat, if we look at their behavior in the Scripture!) and is now speaking to another group of religious leaders, the Pharisees. Jesus says that the greatest commandment in all the law is actually two: love the Lord your God with all your heart, mind, and soul; and love your neighbor as yourself. These two groups of religious leaders like to test him a lot, and while I might want to tell people like them to take a hike, Jesus never does. He always speaks the truth to them, in love, even if he is frustrated with their behavior.

GO: Sometimes it's hard to see how three particular readings fit together on a Sunday, but I was struck by how well these do. The first reading, listing ways that we should *not* behave, can easily be summed up as: love your neighbor as yourself. We all are, or have been, some form of what the Lord mentions: an outsider (alien), vulnerable (widow/orphan), in financial need (loan recipient), or requiring some other assistance (needing a cloak). How do we want others to treat us in those times? Then we should behave the same. It seems like the Thessalonians understood this, for Paul praises them for being a model for other believers. They have a reputation for being truly loving; of turning to God from idols, and serving him. We can be discouraged by our human failings, as all of us living in lockdown/quarantine these recent months know. It may not take much to set us off. But this is where God's grace can help us to speak truth in love, and be a model for those around us.

ACTIONS: Reflect on any obstacles to truly loving God with full heart, mind, and soul. Then think creatively about how to love God, and in turn others.

- How I can love God with my whole heart? After spending time in prayer, write down how you see God in your family and friends. And then go tell them!
- How I can love God with my whole mind? Use "online time" to engage with a faith-related website such as Bishop Barron's wordonfire.org, or follow Pope Francis on Twitter.
- How I can love God with my soul? Pray the litany of humility.
