

Message from Father Bobbin

Dear Parishioners,

We continue our look at the Old Testament prophets. Last week we introduced Isaiah, the longest and most influential prophetic book of the Bible.

As we mentioned last week, the book seems to divide into at least two, perhaps three parts, reflecting different historical time periods. Chapters 1-39 are generally addressed to Jerusalem and Judah in the second half of the 8th century BC, when Judah was threatened by the Assyrian Empire. These chapters contain many oracles of judgment against God's people for their failure to keep their covenant with God.

Like other prophets, social justice is a prominent theme in Isaiah: the need to not only worship God with ritual but by being faithful to Him in everyday life. Other themes emerge in Isaiah more so than in other prophets of his time. An understanding begins to develop that Yahweh, the God of Israel, is not *only* the God of Israel, but God of all. He is the Creator and the Lord of all history. There are no other gods. Isaiah highlights the importance of Jerusalem and the line of King David. As we mentioned last week, there are numerous passages that point to the future Messiah, Jesus. See, for example, Isaiah 7:10-14; 9:1-8; 11:1-9.


SCRIPTURE STUDY

In an effort to keep our parishioners updated on progress with the DMI Survey results, we are sharing with you some of the things we've accomplished so far.

Our first success was getting the survey results published in the bulletin. We hope you saw the results and are excited about our growth as a parish. Our committee gathered for several meetings to compile results and complete a data analysis. This process helped us identify our parish's greatest strengths as well as our areas for growth.

Our second big success was identifying the three Pastoral Priorities that will be the focus of our work for this two-year process. These Pastoral Priorities came from our analysis of the survey results and are as follows:

- 1. Faith Formation/Confidence in the Church's Teachings
- 2. Enriching our Sunday Mass Experience
- 3. Outreach and Evangelization (with an emphasis on young families)

We are currently in the process of creating Focus Groups to help us identify the most critical part of this process, which involves creating goals and action steps. Our ultimate hope is that these steps will enrich all of our parishioners' spiritual journeys. Stay tuned for our next update!

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Although today's Gospel recounts the healing of Bartimaeus' physical blindness, the story is a summons for each of us to be healed of our spiritual blindness. Spiritual blindness, an effect of sin, clouds our ability to perceive who we are and who God is. Paradoxically, Bartimaeus' spiritual eyesight is clear; he recognizes who Jesus is and he sees his own desperate need for Jesus' help. For us, however, sin acts like dust, obstructing our vision and preventing us from perceiving God's presence. We find it difficult to recognize God in other people and in the sacraments; and we likewise become incapable of perceiving ourselves as God sees us. If we wish to have our spiritual eyesight restored, we would do well to imitate Bartimaeus' humble, confident prayer: "Master, I want to see."

Acknowledging our need before God and begging for his help, we invite him to heal our hearts, so that we, like Bartimaeus, may follow Jesus "on the way."

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Where can we seek the healing of our "spiritual sight"? We should look for it from the same person from whom Bartimaeus begged to be cured of his physical blindness: Jesus. But whereas Bartimaeus' encounter with Jesus took place amid noisy crowds of followers and curious onlookers, our most intimate relations with Our Lord take place in the quiet context of prayer and the sacraments. Above all, confession and Eucharistic adoration offer us opportunities to meet God and petition him for the cleansing of our hearts. In confession, we humbly acknowledge our need for conversion and invite God to heal us. In Eucharistic adoration, we approach Jesus with the faith of Bartimaeus, seeing past the appearance of bread and declaring that the consecrated host is indeed God himself. Through these eyes of faith, the Lord heals any blindness, and we can see "and [follow] him on the way."

PRAY Choose a regular time to take advantage of the two opportunities for healing we've discussed – confession and Eucharistic adoration. If you do not already go to confession regularly, consider making it a monthly commitment. Finally, set aside time this week to visit Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament, either in Eucharistic adoration or before the tabernacle in your church. Try visiting him weekly – and then watch how your time in his presence transforms you.
