This Sunday, the last Sunday of our church year, we celebrate Our Lord Jesus Christ the King of the Universe. There are compelling images of Christ on this solemn feast today.

Parish Profile

DAVE DERBES

Dave Derbes has been the organist at St. John's for 33 years. He and his wife Maureen have been married for 34 years and have two daughters, Rebecca and Maureen. He has been involved with the men's choir, the Saturday night choir, Vacation Bible School, and the formation of the ensemble. In addition to playing the organ, Dave also plays the drums, timpani, xylophone, piano, guitar, banjo and ukulele. Along with liturgical music, Dave also enjoys playing bluegrass and Celtic music. He has also composed several pieces for our choirs.



How does music enrich your Catholic faith?

When I started playing the organ at St. John's I wasn't a Catholic. I was already coming to Mass every week with my wife. St. John's had a position open to be an organist and direct the men's choir, so I answered the call. From there, I enrolled in RCIA. Playing the organ brought me back to the Church. I strive to be the Lord's faithful servant by sharing His gift of music with our parish as we celebrate Mass together.

What is your favorite liturgical memory?

There was an ordination Mass we hosted about 15 years ago for Fr. Joe Narog. This was his home parish. We had never done anything like that before as a choir. I got to work with another priest who came up to the choir loft and he was helpful with some sections of the Mass with which we were unfamiliar.

Tell me about your favorite liturgical composition and the inspiration behind it.

We Come Here As Family I composed for the 125th anniversary of the parish. I wrote that in the car while on a drive from Pottsville to Ashland. I would use a tape recorder a lot to catch ideas and phrases for composition purposes. Finally, on that drive, it all clicked, and I stopped at an ice cream store in Ashland to write the whole hymn out. Father Henry was insistent that children should not be separated from their families in a cry room during Mass, so his belief in the importance of coming together as family was the inspiration for the piece. I have been humbled that so many people have commented on the piece or wanted a copy of it over the years. We continue to sing it for weddings, funerals and other events. Our parishioners have really made it their own.

Ez 34:11-12, 15-17 | 1 Cor 15:20-26, 28 | Mt 25:31-46

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Today, we acknowledge and celebrate Christ the King. It's hard to put this royal image together with today's Gospel passage, where Jesus is not asking to be treated like a king, but rather instructing us to perform merciful deeds for the least of his brothers and sisters. Yet it is the perfect follow-on to the previous three Sundays' Scriptures, where Jesus tells us what it means to live a life of holiness, preparation, and faithful investment in the Kingdom. Now we see what awaits those of us who turn over our lives to him, seeing the face of Jesus in the least among us - the poor, the imprisoned, the thirsty, the stranger. "Come, you who are blessed by my Father. Inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world."

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

I confess that judgment day readings scare me a little. Some days I behave more like a "goat" than a "sheep." Side note: After a deep dive into the Internet (did you know that sheep have 54 chromosomes and goats have 60?), I've concluded that Jesus isn't talking about farm animals here. He's talking about us humans and the choices we make or don't make through sins of omission. The list seems endless if I focus on all the things I *could* be doing to help others each and every day. Yet, rather than getting caught up in fear or guilt, today's readings encourage me, and remind me, that Jesus has told us what we need to do to be counted as "sheep" on the last day.

ACTIONS:

- Choose one corporal work of mercy today and act on it. What does it look like to "visit the sick"? Donate blood; make food for someone who isn't feeling well; check in on an elderly neighbor.
- Do you know some "sheep" - people who radiate faith and kindness to others? Just as you might network with a professional in your field, invite that person out for coffee. Ask them about their faith and how it inspires them in their daily lives.
