Dear Parishioners,

Among the joys of the Christmas Season are the many performances of the great Oratorio by George Frideric Handel, which he composed in just twenty-four inspired days. Now, nearly two centuries later, the world still exalts to the strings of Messiah.

At the beginning, long before the familiar Hallelujah Chorus erupts in the ecstatic triumph, Handel recalls the world that waited in darkness for the coming of the Messiah. In this Sunday's gospel, John the Baptist foretells Jesus' coming saying: "One mightier than I is coming after me. I am not worthy to stoop and loosen the thongs of his sandals."

The first part of the Oratorio draws upon Isaiah's prophecies: "Every valley shall be exalted, and every mountain and hill made low, and the crooked straight, and the rough places plain."

Now, two millenniums later, the world still waits the coming of the Messiah.



ANSWERS TO .. WHAT'S YOUR CATHOLIC IQ?

1.(b) The Church retells the story of God becoming human to save us each year during Advent. The liturgical season "recounts the events and prophecies leading up to Christ's birth in Bethlehem but also

reminds Catholics to prepare for Christ's second coming."

- **2. True**. Catholics are called to examine their lives, repent, and turn to God, who will judge between the just and the unjust.
- **3. (d)** Catholic parishes usually mark the four Sundays of Advent by lighting the four candles of the Advent wreath at Mass.
- **4. (a)** Although many Christmas carols are about Christ's birth, Advent songs like this one speak about preparing and longing for Christ.
- **5. (c)** John is the last of the traditional prophets who called for people to repent and turn away from their sins.
- **6. False**. Mary had a hard time explaining to Joseph that she had been visited by an angel of God and was pregnant with God's son (see Matthew 1:18-25).

FROM OUR PARISH NURSE ...

To improve your cardiovascular health, eat more fruit, suggests a recent study in the *New England Journal of Medicine*, which included more than 450,000 people (average age 50) across ten regions in China. Higher fruit consumption was associated with lower systolic blood pressure and lower blood sugar levels – and those who ate fruit daily had a lower risk of having a major cardiovascular event (such as a stroke) and a lower risk of cardiovascular death, compared to those who never ate fruit, after adjusting for various potential confounding factors. According to the paper, "a low level of fruit consumption is a major risk factor for cardiovascular disease, accounting for more than an estimated 104 million disability-adjusted life years worldwide in 2010.
