From the Pastor

Dear Parishioners,

Many Jews because they were under Roman occupation had two names—a Jewish name and a Roman name. Thus, St. Paul already had the name Saul. Most of the time he is called Paul. Occasionally as in this Sunday's first reading from Acts of the Apostles, he is called Saul. Now remember Saul was a zealous Pharisee and a fearless persecutor of all who believed in Christ. As a matter of fact, it was while he was traveling to Damascus to arrest Christians that Jesus appeared to him and convinced him he was all wrong. His life turned around completely and he started preaching and teaching about Jesus. Even after three years in Damascus preaching that Jesus was the Son of God, the Christians community in Jerusalem was not convinced that he was for real. When he first showed up in Jerusalem, we hear in Acts of the Apostles this Sunday, people still didn't trust him.

Barnabas helped Saul enter into the community of the disciples by reporting on Saul's vision of the Lord and his bold proclamation of Jesus' name. In this Sunday's Gospel, Jesus reminds us that he is the true vine and His Father is the vine grower. Those who remain in Him will bear fruit and their needs will be met. To truly stay united to Jesus, we need grounding in two essential ways: first, by taking on the mind of Christ and hearing what the Church proclaims; second, by living in accord with the moral teaching of the Church . Following Jesus asks much of us but offers us the eternal love of the Father in return.

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Why is May the month of Mary?

Among Catholics, May is most well-known as "Mary's Month," a specific month of the year when special devotions are performed in honor of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Why is that? How did May become associated with the Blessed Mother?

There are many different factors that contributed to this association. First of all, in ancient Greece and Rome the month of May was dedicated to pagan goddesses connected to fertility and springtime (Artemis and Flora, respectively). This, combined with other European rituals commemorating the new season of spring, led many Western cultures to view May as a month of life and motherhood. This was long before "Mother's Day" was ever conceived, though the modern celebration is closely related to this innate desire to honor maternity during the spring months.

In the early Church there is also evidence of a major feast of the Blessed Virgin Mary celebrated on the 15th of May each year. A tradition of devoting 30 days to Mary called Tricesimum, which was also known as "Lady Month," was established in the 18th century. After that, various private devotions to Mary quickly became widespread during the month of May. In 1945, Pope Pius XII solidified May as a Marian month after establishing the feast of the Queenship of Mary on May 31st. After the Second Vatican Council, this feast was moved to August 22, while May 31st became the feast of the Visitation of Mary. The month of May is one rich in tradition and a beautiful time of the year to honor our heavenly mother.

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Today's readings are at once challenging and reassuring. Challenging, because we are to remain in Christ, by "[keeping] his commandments and [doing] what pleases him"; and reassuring, because we know that the Holy Spirit is with us and we can "have confidence in God and receive from him whatever we ask." As Jesus says to us, "I am the vine, you are the branches ... without me you can do nothing." Through the Eucharist, the sacraments of the Church, Sacred Scripture, and in belonging to a faith community, God gives us many ways to grow closer to Jesus, and to direct our life toward him. In the pruning of sinful habits from our lives and building us up, through grace, to walk in the fear of the Lord, God transforms our hearts so that we remain in him, and he in us. And with the help of the Holy Spirit, we are enabled to speak out boldly in the name of the Lord.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Just as the new life and growth of springtime is already very visible in many parts of the United States, today's first reading describes a kind of springtime in the Church. Even as Saul faced multiple death threats, he continued to boldly proclaim the Good News. "The church throughout all Judea, Galilee, and Samaria was at peace. It was being built up and walked in the fear of the Lord, and with the consolation of the Holy Spirit it grew in numbers." Today, many Christians around the world face persecution for their beliefs or live in cities or countries where violence, poverty, or hunger threaten their lives. We, too, face challenges and hardships. Life is not easy! Let us find "consolation" in the Holy Spirit and build up the Church and one another through prayer, generosity, and friendship.

PRAY Consider spending an hour with Jesus in Eucharistic adoration. Find a small way to build up the Church beyond your family and parish by praying for Christians in other parts of the world.
